

DEATH OF JAMES NEWLIN

PIONEER QUAKER PREACHER
PASSED AWAY.

Was One of the Best Known Men of
the West End of the County—Fath-
er of Dr. W. H. Newlin, Trustee of
Monroe Township—Had Lived Here
For Many Years.

The Rev. James Newlin, one of the
earliest settlers of Monroe township,
died at his home at New London at 9
o'clock Monday evening. Death re-
sulted from paralysis, coupled with a
complication of diseases. While his
health had not been good for the last
several months, his condition did not
become serious until a short time ago.

Mr. Newlin was brought to Howard
county nearly seventy years ago by
his parents. He was seventy-six
years of age when he died, and prac-
tically all of his life was spent in that
neighborhood. He was pastor of the
Friends church there for years, and
for a time was pastor of the Friends
church in this city. He was kindly
and a gentle man, loving his work, and
striving always to the utmost at the
thing at hand. He did what he found
to do, unhesitatingly, thoroughly and
uncomplainingly. He has left a rich
heritage in a good life cleanly lived.

He is survived by his widow and
four children. The latter are Dr. W.
H. Newlin, trustee of Monroe town-
ship, residing at New London; Thom-
as Newlin of Windfall, Mrs. Ella Tay-
lor of New London, and Mrs. Emma
Clark of New London. One brother
survives, Dr. Newlin of California,
and two sisters, Mrs. Jane Moore of
this city and Mrs. John Hockett of
New London.
