Bogue died at 12:55 a.m. Thursday, Feb. 25, 1993, in the facility.

He was born Sept. 11, 1892, in Huntsville, Ala., a son of Parker and Mary Elizabeth (Madison) Bogue. Nov. 25, 1918, he married Ella Fellow, who died in April 1982.

Bogue retired from Delco Electronics in 1957 after 14 years of service and retired from Indiana Conference of the United Methodist Church in 1958. He was a National Chaplain, minister of visitation for Grace United Methodist Church, and chaplain for unchurched youngsters over 70 at Saint Joseph Hospital & Health Center and Indiana World War I veterans for 25 years.

He was a veteran of World War I and a member of Kokomo Noon Lions, a 32nd degree Mason, Scottish Rite Valley of Indianapolis and Golden Agers. He was active in Boy Scouts of America and YMCA.

He attended Theological Seminary at Northwestern University and Garrett Theological Seminary. Bogue received a bachelor degree from Northwestern University and divinity degree from Garrett University and was a 1915 graduate of DePaul University.

He was student pastor at Wesley Fellowship at Purdue University in 1923 and moved to Kokomo in 1943. In 1924 he started in the Methodist ministry in the North Indiana Conference.

Surviving are a son, James Bogue of Crete, Ill.; two daughters, Mrs. Richard (Dottie) Miller of Corvallis, Ore., and Mrs. Earl (Phyllis) Smith of Kokomo; 12 grandchildren; four stepgrandchildren; 26 great-grandchildren; 11 stepgreat-grandchildren; and a stepgreat-great-grandchild. Five brothers and five sisters preceded him in death.
